### **Understanding your GuideU report:** Interest's, skills, values summary.

In a typical work week, you will spend on average 44% of your waking hours at work. So you need to enjoy what you do and it needs to be connected to what you do well, if you want to experience success and fulfilment.

If you are completing this workbook, you have already undertaken the GuideU online career assessment and have received your comprehensive report via email.

Let's consider your report and the ideas it has raised. The report has provided you with a summary of your responses compared to a large group of people with a similar background and experience. Any comparisons made are not 'good' or 'bad', they are just a reference point for us to explore your options.

1. Read through the summary of your interests, skills and values? Do you feel like this is an accurate description of you?



This report finishes by providing you a list of recommended jobs. For your consideration, these jobs have been organised based on the level of study you require to undertake the job. This is helpful, because you can choose to pursue careers based on your current level of study, or what you would like to study in the future.

The report will provide job recommendations within the following zones:

JOB ZONE 1	Typically require a secondary school (high school) certificate.
JOB ZONE 2	Typically require secondary school (or high school) certificate, TAFE qualifications or a bachelor's degree.
JOB ZONE 3	Typically require related on-the-job experience, TAFE qualifications or a bachelor's degree.
JOB ZONE 4	Typically require a two-four year bachelor's degree.
JOB ZONE 5	Typically require either a bachelor's or a post-graduate degree.

We are now going to guide you to explore these options, so that you can obtain clarity about what career path you wish to pursue.

## Steps to research

- 1. Visit http://joboutlook.gov.au/keyword.aspx and type one of your suggested job roles in the search tab.
- 2. This will take you to a list of occupations. Click on the one most relevant to you.



3. This will take you to a profile of that occupation with various tabs you can explore to unlock more information. Key tabs to explore include; overview, prospects, and skills.



- 4. Using the information gathered, fill in the below table to allow you to compare across the various roles.
- 5. After completing the table, consider each factor about your selected job titles.
- 6. Compare the jobs and then add a number in the first column, putting the jobs in order from one to eight from your least favourite to your most favourite.
- 7. This list will become the list of jobs you start targeting. We will show you how to do this in the next module; Job Search Process: Your Vehicle.
